Course Structure / Schedule: (3+0+0) 3 / 5 ECTS

Extended Description:

This course mainly introduces common mental health problems in childhood and adolescence as well as the psychological intervention methods used by the professionals in the field. Through lectures, readings and case studies from the field of child and adolescent mental health, the course will explore this particular area of psychology and provide the students with a framework for understanding the emergence, maintenance and treatment of some of the common mental health challenges which arise during childhood and adolescence.

The door of the class will be closed 10 minutes after the class has started. If the door is closed, it means that the class has started. In this case, STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED NOT TO ENTER and WAIT until the first break.

Attendance is required and it will be taken within the first 10 minutes of each slot. Students who miss the first slot will be marked absent for the whole hour.

Students must have a legitimate reason for leaving early (before the class ends) and they should inform the instructor in advance.

Civil behavior involves being considerate and polite as required by social norms, towards all classmates and the instructor. Ethical behavior involves honorable conduct and refraining from all forms of cheating and plagiarism.

Students are expected to turn their cell phones off in the classroom. Using cell phones during class will be cause for dismissal from the classroom, and the student will be marked absent for the whole hour.
