Catalog Description: The development of cultural studies as an approach to communication studies; German Franfurt School of Critical Theory, British Cultural Studies, American Cultural Studies. Course Structure / Schedule : (3+0+0) 3 / 6 ECTS

Extended Description:

During this course we will examine the concept of culture: from the first culture towards the 'cultivated' human being, from its first appearance in relation to nature in Roman civilization towards modern societies as mass culture. Through this historical patterns, we will examine the basic elements which traverse and create the tension in the notion of culture as a part of identity: collective versus individual, inside versus outside, past versus future. The different paradigms of modern mass culture will be analyzed through their way of functioning: how levity-annoyance-leisure effect ans subscribe on individuality, through media, body and the city. The last part of this course will cover different critical approaches: the Critical Theory of the Frankfurt School (Adorno, Benjamin, Habermas), French Milieu—structuralism, poststructuralism, situationist—(Levi-Strauss, Barthes, Foucault, Debord) and the British School in Cultural Studies (Hall, Hoggart).
