Catalog Description:Survey of music history starting from the Antiquity to the beginning of the Romantic Period, stressing the major characteristics of each era, examining the development of musical styles, forms and instruments, studying the important composers and masterpieces, analyzing and synthesizing learnt course material to write an essay, essentials of preparing a concert program, and expressing impressions on a concert.	Textbook / Required Material:No textbook is required. Lecture notes are to be obtained each week before lesson from the copy center.

Course Structure / Schedule: (3+0+0) 3 / 6 ECTS

Extended Description: Each historical era produces its own variety of artistic expression and musical styles depending on the political ideology of rulers and the opportunities for individual composers. This course will begin by looking at when and how music started among human beings and the varieties of music, musical instruments, rituals and philosophies during Antiquity. We will also examine how ideology affected musical forms and production in the Middle Ages, the Gothic Era and the Renaissance. This will be followed by lectures on the major masterpieces and composers of the Baroque Era. Finally, we will comprehend the road from the Baroque Era to the Classical Period, the main features of the Classical Period and its effects on music, the new styles and forms of music in the Classical Period, and the important composers and masterpieces written in this period.
