Extended Description: In this course we will explore approaches to the most fundamental human communicative practice—telling stories. Narrative genres have been both objects of study as well as tools to understand the social imagination of particular groups at times in history. We will begin by understanding the way that folklorists have approached traditional narrative genres such as folktale, myth, legend, fairy tale and how they continue to study emergent narrative genres in urban legends, personal narrative, and oral history. We will cover approaches such as structuralism, performance theory and feminism. Students will utilize these approaches and their understanding of genre to conduct their own collection project.
