Catalog Description: The homeland(s) of the Turks; distinctive life ways in the steppes of Eurasia;”states” in Inner Asia; the Scythic era; Eurasian invasions; Chinese historiography; Eurasian life style. Social organizations of the steppes; Uighur, Turk and Khazar empires. Religions of the steppes. The relations with the neighboring nomadic and sedentary peoples.	Textbook / Required Material :

Extended Description : This course aims to introduce students to the history of Turkic peoples as part of the history of humanity. The course will specifically focus on the origin of the Turks, the countries where they lived, their political and social organizations, their religion and the relations with the neighboring nomadic and sedentary peoples. It will focus on the homelands of the Turks, and the distinctive lifeways in this region that shape the larger social and political units. States in Inner Asia took distinctive forms and operated according to different principles from the great states of Europe, but still were in contact with them. This course intends to give information about the profound conversions that Turks underwent over time and place. It will look at continuities and ruptures in the journey of the Turks from Inner Asia to Anatolia.
