It examines different political and economic systems and considers the formation of the first, second, and third worlds. It explores the different paths that countries may pursue to foster development and democratization, and helps understand the costs and benefits of these policies. Throughout the class students analyze successful and failed examples of each path and consider their applicability to different countries. Finally, the course turns its focus to our own backyard, the Middle East and considers examples of non-Western modernities such as modern Islamist movements and sources of Islamic economic development.
