Catalog Description: Improve academic English skills at an upper-intermediate level through modules which include academic writing, academic research methodology and research report writing, negotiating skills and debating skills, advanced listening skills, and critical reading skills. Course Structure / Schedule: (3+0+0) 3 / 5 ECTS

Extended Description: This course will focus on developing the students essential academic skills at an upper-intermediate level by focusing on academic thinking skills, research techniques, report writing, oral presentation, debating and listening. Academic skills of paraphrasing, summary writing, and forming a logical argument are thought through authentic material on current issues e.g. nanotechnology, cloning, gm technology.
